- 1. MR. G. DISHO, MP. (OKAVANGO EAST): To ask the Minister of (346) Environment and Tourism:
 - when he will consider drilling boreholes in Deception valley as wild animals walk long distances to Sunday Pan and Letiahau and eventually abandon the area for the whole peak season or half a year;
 - (ii) when the road from Matswiri, Tsau and New Xade Gates will be gravelled to facilitate easy movement; and
 - (iii) if his Ministry will drill boreholes in Makgadikgadi for the 50 000 zebras, elephants and other small animals as they now have to walk long distances to Boteti and Jacks Camp searching for water.
- 2. MR. M. M. MOROLONG, MP. (KGATLENG CENTRAL): To ask the Minister of (349) Local Government and Traditional Affairs to state:
 - (i) the criteria and format used to calculate terminal benefits of Councillors;
 - (ii) the total amount of terminal benefits for the 2019–2024 Councillors; and
 - (iii) whether there are unresolved queries surrounding their terminal benefits.
- 3. MR. C. K. JACOBS, MP. (LOBATSE): To ask the Minister of Health if he is aware of the state and situation at Sbrana Psychiatric Hospital particularly in terms of health risks, that include patients wellbeing, state of the facility and wellbeing of employees.
- 4. MR. R. W. KAIZER, MP. (SELEBI PHIKWE WEST): To ask the Minister of (352) Transport and Infrastructure to state:
 - (i) when last the Botswana Railways (BR) Organisational and Salary Structures were reviewed and implemented;
 - (ii) if the two (2) structures were both reviewed and implemented across all positions; if not, why not;

- (iii) why there is a huge disparity between the highest paid and the least paid employee; and
- (iv) when there will be a review and increment of salaries for the BR staff.
- 5. MR. A. K. KHAN, MP. (MOLEPOLOLE NORTH): To ask the Minister for State (353) President to explain the functions and roles of the Department of Broadcasting Services and Department of Information Services; and to further state:
 - (i) the staff compliment for each department in terms of core duty and support staff;
 - the number of outstations each department has, and how many outstations are headed by personnel in salary scales C1, D4, D3, D2 and D1 in each department;
 - why the Department of Information Services has more officers heading outstations on C1 and D3 salary scales whereas the same is not done at the Department Broadcasting Services;
 - (iv) the number of officers (reporters) on C1 salary scale top notch in the Department of Information Services and Department of Broadcasting Services; and
 - (v) why employees at the Department of Broadcasting Services seem to progress better career wise than those working for the Department of Information Services.
- 6. MR. S. O. MAPULANGA, MP. (CHOBE): To ask the Minister of Lands and (354) Agriculture to state:
 - (i) the status and ownership of the Nyungu (Ko Letswaing) Basubiya royal ruins;
 - (ii) when the ownership changed and how it changed from the community to the current status and ownership;
 - (iii) when and where consultations with the affected community were held regarding the status and ownership of the ruins;
 - (iv) whether the Nyungu royal ruins cannot be restored to community ownership under the management of Cisiya Nkulu Trust:
 - (v) the whereabouts of artefacts which included human bones and pottery that were excavated from the Nyungu ruins area:

- (vi) whether the Ministry would allow access to the artefacts by academics and researchers representing the community to document observations that will add to the literature and heritage of the Basubiya tribe which has inhabited the area from about AD 900 according to accient archaeological research;
- (vii) the status and ownership of the Ghoha Hills areas and when such status and ownership were assumed;
- (viii) whether the ownership and/or management of the Ghoha Hills area cannot be restored to the community through the management of Cisiya Nkulu Trust;
- whether he is aware that the Ghoha Hill is an ancient Subiya settlement/village with two graves of former Basubiya chiefs, a water well, castor oil medicinal plants and other sites that need preservation and official acknowledgement as part of Basubiya heritage; and
- whether he is aware that the settlements/ruins of Nyungu and Ghoha Hills are documented by some of the renowned researchers/authors such as Mr Anthony Sillery (1952, pp. 190 193), Professors Thomas Tlou and Christine Saidi, Messrs Daniel Shamukuni, and Nicholas Katanekwa (archaeologist) to mention but a few.
- 7. MR. M. M. PULE, MP. (KGATLENG EAST): To ask the Minister of (355) Environment and Tourism to state:
 - (i) concrete steps that Government has taken to implement key policy objectives of the Climate Change Policy, 2021, particularly on efforts to reduce dependence on fossil fuel, enhance food security in drought-prone areas as well as to address increasing climate variability;
 - (ii) measures in place to ensure adequate climate financing and whether Botswana is leveraging on international funding sources such as the Green Climate Fund (GCF) to support adaptation and mitigation efforts; and
 - (iii) plans to review and strengthen climate adaptation strategies, particularly for communities that are mostly at risk of extreme weather events considering that Botswana remains highly vulnerable to climate change effects.
- 8. MR. P. M. SEGOKGO, MP. (TLOKWENG): To ask the Minister of Local (356) Government and Traditional Affairs:
 - (i) if he is aware:

- of a sewerage tender that was awarded by the Council in Ramfurwa Ward in 2011;
- (b) that the company did not complete the work;
- that the P4 Million that was budgeted for the tender is still in Government coffers; and
- (ii) if he will consider sending this money to Water Department to continue with the project and help Ramfurwa residents.
- 9. MR. J. J. FRENZEL, MP. (SHASHE WEST): To ask the Minister for State (358) President:
 - (i) if he is aware of the lack of a fully functional police station between Francistown and Orapa;
 - (ii) what plans are in place to rectify the situation; and
 - (iii) when the lack of police vehicles at Chadibe and Mabesekwa villages will be addressed.
- 10. MR. T. FURNITURE, MP. (TATI EAST): To ask the Minister of Health if he is aware of the deplorable conditions of Ditladi Health Post and that the building is old and has not been maintained for a long time; if so, what does he intend doing to rectify this situation.
- 11. DR. K. GOBOTSWANG, MP. (TSWAPONG SOUTH): To ask the Minister of (362) Lands and Agriculture if he is aware that the process of merging public entities to constitute the National Agricultural Research and Development Institute (NARDI) experienced critical challenges. The Minister should specifically state:
 - (i) whether the National Food Technology Research Centre (NFTRC) in Kanye has been fully integrated into NARDI and explain why it continues to have a care taker;
 - (ii) if assets from NFTRC were fully transferred to NARDI;
 - (iii) if he is aware that since 2022 there are researchers from NFTRC who continue to be paid salaries they remain staying at home because they opted not to be relocated to NARDI;
 - (iv) if he is aware that Farm Technicians were given employment offer letters that were later retracted and to state the reasons for doing so; and
 - (v) what he is doing to remedy the situation at NARDI.
- **MR. L. BARONGWANG, MP. (MOGODITSHANE EAST):** To ask the Minister of (363) Environment and Tourism:
 - (i) if any comprehensive study with a detailed report has ever been conducted to provide feedback from the Hotel and Tourism Business community following the introduction and implementation of local travel per diem;

- (ii) to provide latest data from the Ministry on;
 - (a) decline and/or increase in occupancy rates at licensed small to medium hotels, lodges, and guesthouses across the country;
 - (b) the number of small to medium accommodation providers that have closed their operations since the Policy's implementation;
- (iii) to outline measures put in place to ensure that the Local Travel Per Diem Policy does not adversely affect the small to medium hotels, guest houses and lodges operators; and
- (iv) how the Government ensures that the Government travel expenditure directly supports small to medium, dully registered, and tax-compliant local businesses.
